Notes

- Note 1: On the Home Page of the Columbine WebSite, select “On-Line Archives” at the bottom of the selections in the left column. This will take you to the “On-Line Archives” starting page.
- Note 2: On the On-Line Archives starting page there are 14 selections. [See On-Line Archives page on reverse side.]
- Note 3: For the static databases (s1 thru s11), every name is indexed and can be searched with the ZOOM Search Engine. From the On-Line Archives starting page the search covers ALL of the 11 static databases sub-sites. When searching from the individual sub-sites, the search only searches that sub-site on the “initial search.”
- Note 4: The dynamic databases (d1 thru d3) are in a database format (Access). Neither the ZOOM Search Engine nor Google can index into these databases. The user must, instead, follow the steps to go through the pages/names individually to determine if the name you are interested in is in the sub-site.
- Note 5: Colorado Cemetery Index WebSite has only one alphabetic listing in contrast to the shelved books, in which each volume has its own alphabetic listing, thus searching the book versions requires a researcher to go through each book to find names.
- Note 6: Colorado Territory Civil War Records and Colorado Cemetery Index contain the oldest records. These publications are likely to be the most likely to uncover a pre-1900 ancestor that you may not have known to have been in Colorado.
- Note 3: Bemis Bibliography, a dynamic database, covers the genealogy and history reference books at Bemis Library. It allows searches by category, state, county and country. It will quickly and easily uncover publications for your areas of interest. You will find books in areas of your interest at Bemis that you never knew were there.
- Note 7: ZOOM (Online Archives only) indexes every name, therefore no names will be missed when searched.
- Note 8: Google and ZOOM searches are great tools, but all possible spellings of a name should be searched. Also to be sure you haven't missed an odd spelling of a name, it is recommended that the researcher also do manual searches for names. That is, step through the On-line Archives pages, scanning for different spellings. This is particularly important for the Colorado Territory Civil War Records as strange spellings were recorded.

WebSite Statistics

On-Line Archives:

1. The total surnames in the On-Line Archives is approximately 226,800. There are approximately 25,000 more names of categories, cemeteries, places and other names.
2. ZOOM Search has indexed over 90,000 “unique” names in the On-Line Archives. This represents a number that is nearly 2 1/2 times the size of a normal dictionary. ZOOM has not indexed the “main” Columbine web pages. Google has indexed the “main” web pages, as well as the On-Line Archives. However, Google only indexes the first 50 lines of any page. Most pages in the On-Line Archives are longer than 50 lines.
3. On September 1, 2009, the “hits” on the Columbine WebSite reached 1,000,000 year-to-date.
4. In July 2009, 1,452 “unique” users accessed the Columbine WebSite, an all-time high. Also all-time highs were reached in July for Number of Visits (1,830) and Pages Visited (6,477).
5. We know of user access from the Fiji Islands to Denmark because of inquiries from those countries.
